Carling Frankenmuth Personnel Hailed For Three-Year Perfect Safety Record

Our third consecutive year without a lost-time injury has brought unprecedented acclaim to all employees of our Carling Frankenmuth brewery, including special recognition from the National Safety Council via a report that our plant is the only brewery ever to win the Safety Council's coveted Award of Merit for three consecutive years.

The recently-acquired NSC Award of Merit is the sixth major award received this year, and the 17th national safety honor bestowed upon us since September 8, 1955, when our current

lost-time accident-free record began.

Other awards won for our 1958 safety record include the NSC's Sectional Award, the U.S. Brewers' Foundation First Place Award, the traveling Carling President's Cup (for the second year), a Carling President's plaque for achieving the best safety record of any Carling brewery, and three special Aetna Insurance Company safety plaques.

These were presented by Aetna officials to Jack Price, Brewing, Edward Johnson, Bottling, and Leo A. Rousseau, Engineering, for the outstanding records in supervising safety activities in their respective departments.

Commenting on the many awards, Vice President Les Freidinger said, "We are especially proud of our record and pleased to be recognized for having achieved it.

"But, more importantly, the true value of these accomplishments lies in the fact that they indicate that in the past several years not a single man or woman in our plant has suffered a painful, disabling injury, and that the welfare of not one of our families has been jeopardized because its breadwinner was hurt and unable to work.

Sales of 3,531,182 Barrels Place Carling In Fifth Position In Brewing Industry

Final reports of the brewing industry reveal that last year, as in each of the past 10 years, our company made a substantial gain in sales and continued its climb to a new high position among the nation's brewers

Sales of 3,531,182 barrels during 1958 raised our company to fifth position in the industry. Significantly, this sales total did not include the 1958 sales of our newly-acquired Tacoma, Washington, brewery—hence further substantial growth is indicated for the current year.

In the past ten years, our company has climbed from 62nd position in the brewing industry to its present place as the fifth largest producer. Ten years ago, our sales were 361,500 barrels.

If you wonder just how many cases and bottles of beer and ale are represented by our 1958 sales, the total breaks down to 48,651,841 cases and over one billion 12-ounce bottles — 1,167,644,184 bottles, to be exact!




Coming Merchandising and Promotion Plans Revealed to 288 Michigan Driver-Salesmen
