

Installation of New CO2 Facilities Eliminates Major Production Worry

The new Carbon Dioxide liquefying system, now in operation in the plant, enables all of us to breathe a little easier.

With the new system in operation, we can now proceed with repairing the old facilities which were installed about 21 years ago and never since repaired because of insufficient storage capacity to permit closing them down for any considerable period of time.

Installed under the supervision of Plant Engineer Leo A. Rousseau, the new facilities include a huge CO2 liguefying and storage tank, and a CO2 washer and CO2 dryer.

This costly new equipment, in addition to providing additional capacity, protects all of us against the losses which would have occurred had the old equipment broken down at any time, thereby stalling all production operations.

We're certainly glad it's now on the job!
