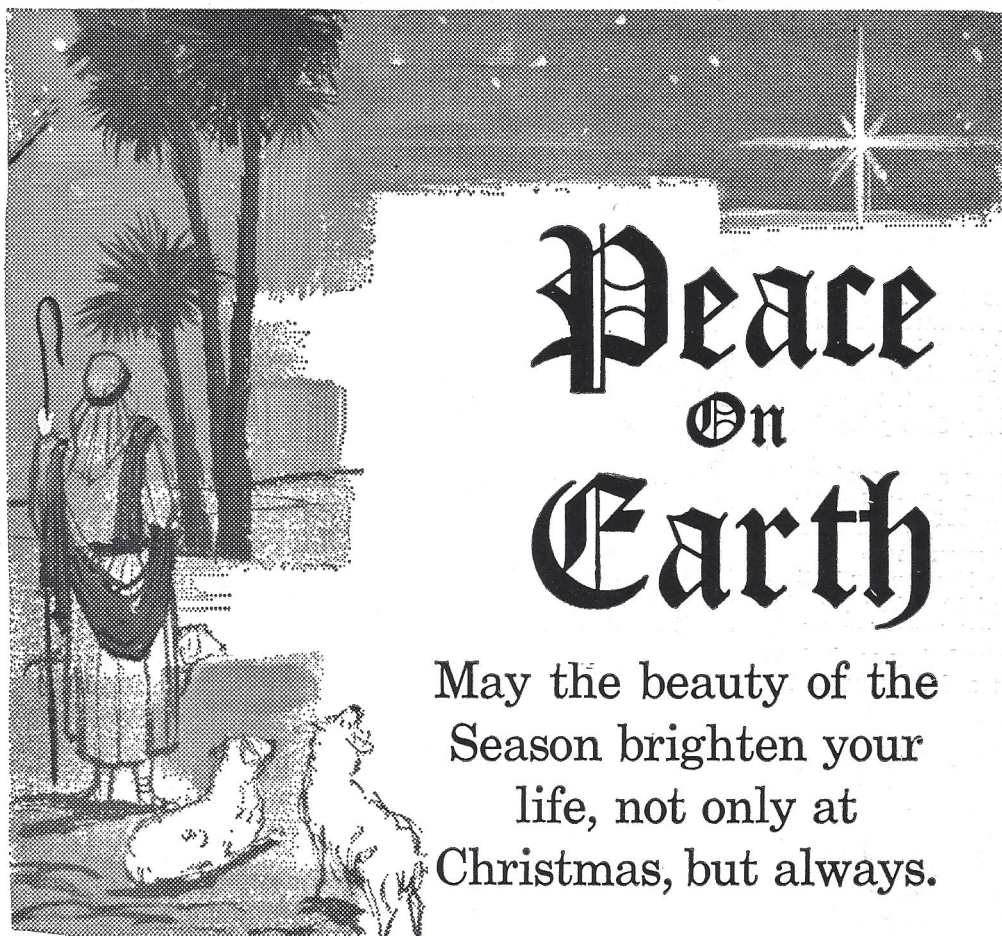

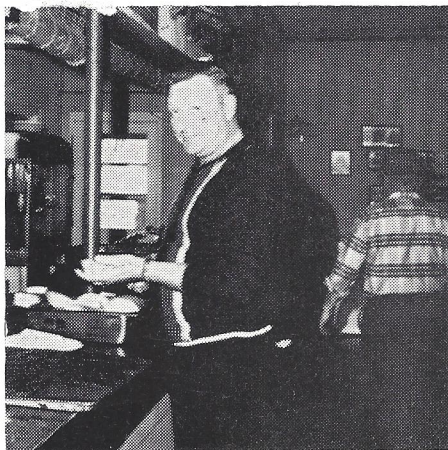


'THE HUSTLERS'—Matt Szymanski is about to rack up the last pool ball as Bob Matzke waits his turn. The pool table was in action constantly.

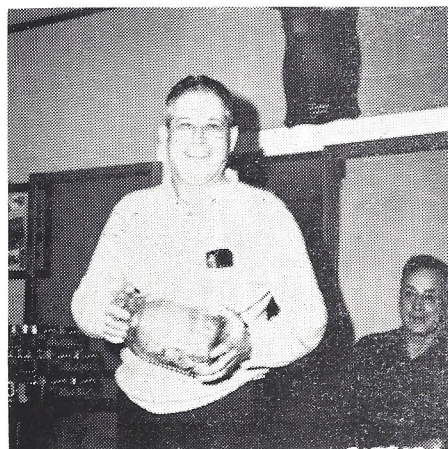

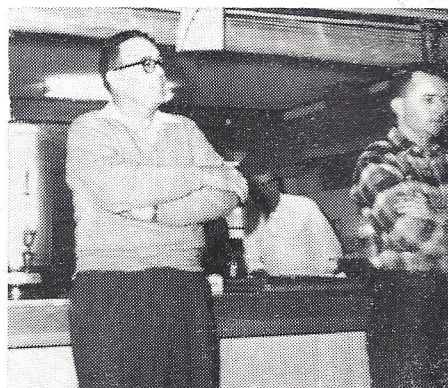

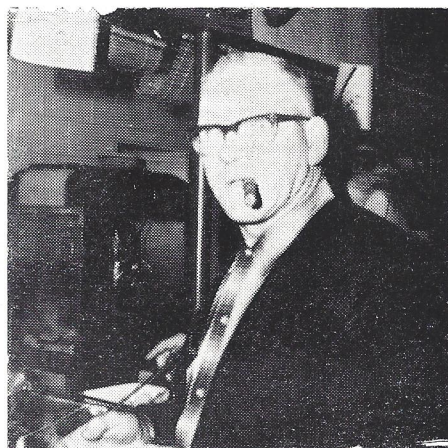

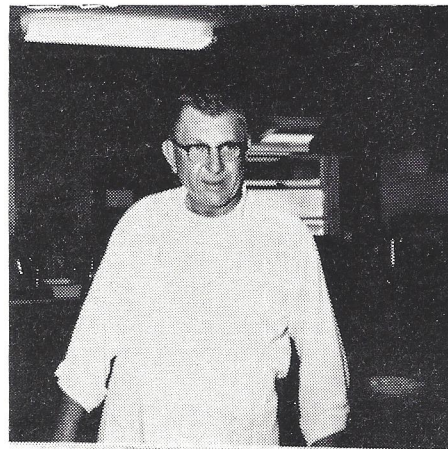

30 Compete In Season's Hunt Contest

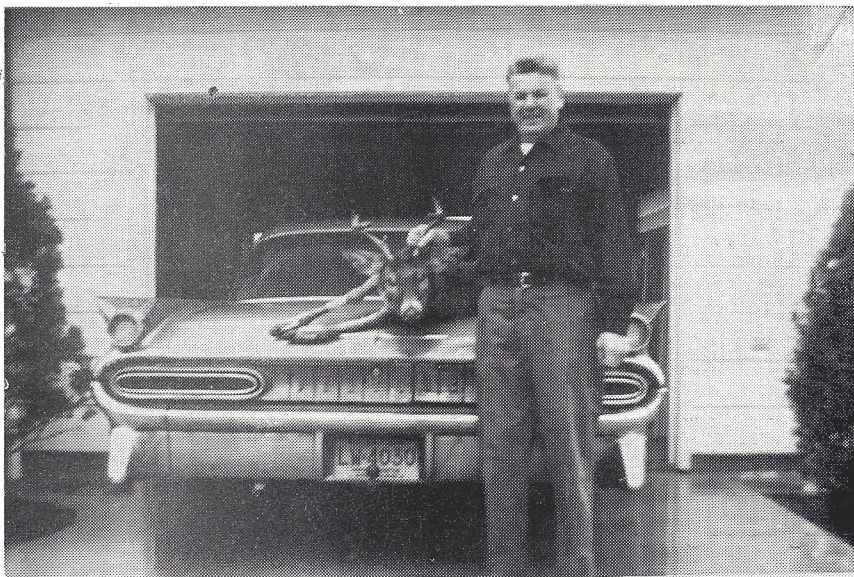
This wasn't the best deer hunting season ever because of the weather and other factors but 30 stalwart Carling hunters took to the woods to compete in plant's annual deer hunting contest.

Ottomar Rupprecht, who hunted near Hillman, bagged a 124-pound deer which was the heaviest shot in the contest. It won Otts \$24 and two cases of Black Label. There were eight in his hunting party and they took home six deer.

Peter Arnold also won \$24 and two cases of beer for bringing home a deer with eight antler points, biggest rack in the contest. Pete didn't have to travel far. He scored while hunting near St. Charles.

Galen Ferguson won \$12 and a case of Black Label for the lightest deer at 97 pounds. He hunted near Rose City.

Other Carling hunters who shot deer but who were not in the contest were: Charles Baldwin, who got a 110-pound, five-point buck hunting near Houghton Lake; Glenn Auernhamer, who shot a 115-pound, four-point deer hunting in the Upper Peninsula near Escanaba, and Alfred Matzke, who got a 121-pound buck hunting near Glennie.

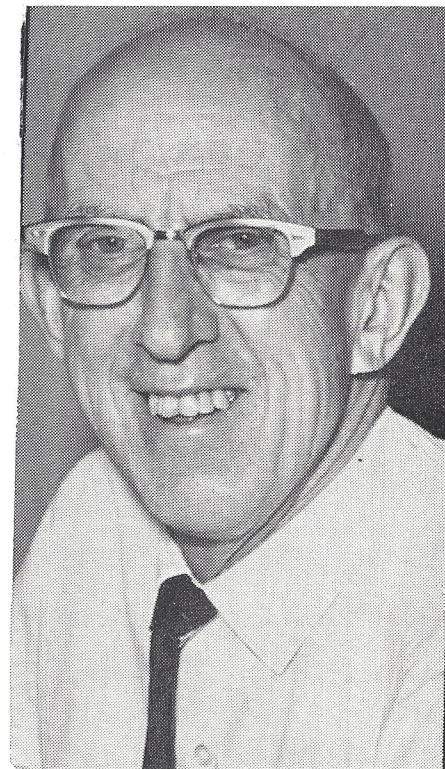
Salute to Natick
