Carling To Co-Sponsor Championship Fight Broadcast

Carling Brewing Co. has signed to cosponsor broadcast of the Paterson-Johansson heavyweight championship fight March 13 on the ABC radio network, Robert C. Garretson, Carling vice-president for marketing has announced.

Carling will share sponsorship of this exclusive broadcast with the Mennen Co. on behalf of Black Label beer.

ABC Radio paid a record sum to Teleprompter Corp. for exclusive U.S. radio rights to the fight, which will be staged in Miami, Fla. This is the third meeting of Patterson and Johansson and a "rub-

\$5.5 Million Project Spread Over 3 Years

Exciting and significant news is he recent announcement by President Ian R. Dowie that Carling Brewing Co. plans a \$5.5 million, three-year program to expand production and shipping facilities in our plant!

The improvement here is keyed to Carling's rapid rise to the forefront of the brewing indusary, moving from 62nd to fourth place in sales in 11 years.

Mr. Dowie said our plant's \$5.5 million improvement program includes cost of land acquisition.

An 81,500 square-feet addition will be built on the south side of our plant. It will be substantially completed by this November. Its appearance will match the pleasing architure of our present building.

By April of 1962 a new high-speed bottling line will be operating in the new building, and will improve warehouse and shipping facilities.

By June, 1963, additional warehouse and shipping faciliies will be constructed, totaling 47,500 square feet. Two additional bottling and canning lines are planned there.

MR. DOWIE SAID completion of the expansion and modernization program will substantially increase the annual capacity of our plant above the 600,000 barrels of Black Label Beer and Red Cap Ale it now produces.

The construction program will begin soon.

Mr. Dowie said Carling sold 4,822,075 barrels of beer and ale last year for a 9.1 per cent gain over the 1959 volume.

In 1949 OUR COMPANY had plant in Cleveland and a sales volume of 361,500 barrels - less than last year's


total gain.



Schmunk Elected Union President


George Schmunk of our Brewhouse is the new president of Local 212, International Union of United Brewery and Soft Drink Workers of America (AFL-

Five Safe Years!


We'll be getting more safety trophies and awards soon for display with others in the plant clubrooms because of our proud record of five calendar years without a disabling injury.

They Don't 'Just Happen'; There's Always Reason

What does the word "accident" mean to you?

Is it a broken leg, or a bruised foot, or a burn?

These happenings aren't accidents — they are injuries.

"Injuries happen as the result of doing something the wrong or the unsafe way too many times!"

For instance, a mechanic, without thinking, will pick up a hand file, without a handle, to do a small vise job.

(You know that the tang of such a file usually rests about on the edge of the palm of hand.)

Well, that mechanic will use such a file one, or ten, or a hundred times and nothing will happen.

But, finally, some day the file gets him and the sharp point will be driven into his hand.

In other words, that mechanic will get hurt sooner or later — he can't miss it — if he keeps using a file without a handle.

So "an accident" is the unsafe act which causes the injury sooner or later. If a mechanic slips a handle over the

tang of the file before he uses it — he can never injure his palm because that's the safe way to use a file.

If we are going to cut out injuries, we must cut out the unsafe acts that cause the injuries.

And using a file is no different from sweeping the floor or handling material or operating a machine, or any other job in this plant.
