CARLING TEAM ENTERS ALL-STAR LEAGUE


A Carling softball team has been entered in the Thumb All-Star League this season.

Frankenmuth Trio Design and Construct Giant Scoreboard For Carling Open Tourney



There's an old sports axiom to the effect that "You can't tell the players without a scoreboard." And, while there are no "scorecards" at a major golf tournament, there remains the problem of identifying the players and keeping tab on the individual players.

That problem has been solved, insofar as the 1957 Carling Open is concerned, by Willie Brechtelsbauer, of the Maintenance Department, working under the supervision of Plant Engineer Leo A. Rosseau, and Leo F. Rousseau, assistant engineer.

Together, the three men designed and constructed a huge, 40-foot-long scoreboard that is large enough to display prominently all the golfers who will compete in the '57 Carling Open, to be held June 20-23 at the nearby Flint Golf Club.

The big board was constructed economically (largely of scrap mterials), and was so designed by Messrs. Leo. F. and Leo A. Rousseau so that it can be broken down and shipped to other cities which may serve as hosts to the future Carling Opens. The largest section measures 10 by 5 feet.
