Once again this year our support of the Saginaw County United Fund Drive went well "over the top," demonstrating again that, as a group, our Carling Frankenmuth Family is concerned with the human needs of those not so fortunate as we are.

A total of \$5,018.85 - including our company's "Fair Share" participation -- was subscribed to the county fund via cash donations and our payroll deduction plan for giving. Ninety-four per cent of our personnel contributed to the total collected, which exceeded last year's amount by 14 per cent.

Michael Aicher, director of employee relations for the U.S. Brewers Foundation, said Carling Frankenmuth's safety achievement "demonstrates what can be done in the brewing industry.

"You've done a tremendous thing," he said, "and you are fortunate you are working for a company that is going to remain in business, and that you have at the head of your company men who believe your well-being is important."
