Prizes Announced Hunters' Jack Pot 'Boiling'

It's that time of year again -- for the annual Carling Frankenmuth deer hunters' jackpot, limited to buck deer trophies only.

The entry fee is \$2 and there will be three prizes. The first is for the heaviest buck deer (three-antler minimum), which will be two-fifths of the total entry fee collected and two cases of Black Label beer.

Second prize will be for the most antler points (these must be at least one-half inch long from the outside of the shaft) and also will be two-fifths of the total entry fee collected, plus two cases of Black Label. In the event of a tie, the heaviest deer wins.

There also will be a third prize, for the lightest buck deer (three antlers minimum), which will be one-fifth of the total amount collected, plus one case of Black Label.

All entry fees had to be turned in to Harold (Silver) Matzke, Brewing Department, or Ottomar Rupprecht, Bottling Department, by Friday, Nov. 13.

All buck deer are to be weighed in at the Brewhouse. The seal tag number must correspond with the hunter's license number. All seals must be locked.

If only one buck is brought in, it would be eligible for all three prizes. If only two bucks are brought in, one would be eligible for two prizes. If three or more bucks are brought in, only one per buck will be given.

The important factor is not the size of the group of minds, but the size of the minds in the group.



Carling Buys Another Plant

Carling Brewing Company has agreed to purchase the assets of Arizona Brewing Company, Inc. of Pheonix it was announced today in a joint statement by Henry E. Russell, Carling President and Herb Lindner, President of Arizona Brewing. It will be Carling's ninth plant in the U.S.A.

Mr. Russell declined to disclose the purchase price but said that the transaction was for cash and included all of the assets of Arizona Brewing Company.

Arizona Brewing Company was founded in 1934 and last year sold in excess of 150,000 barrels of beer which put it in second place in beer sales in Arizona.

ABC also markets its Lanser A-1 beer in Southern California, Southern Nevada, Southern Utah and parts of Colorado and New Mexico.

Mr. Russell said, "We are delighted to be able to acquire this property which, when coupled with our newly constructed plant in Fort Worth, Texas, gives us production facilities strategically located in areas experiencing the fastest growth in the United States."

Carling is the nation's 4th largest brewer and in 1963 had sales of 5,681,-141 barrels. Its brands are Black Label, Heidelberg and Stag beers and Red Cap Ale

Our company has seven other plans besides ours. These are located in Atlanta, Georgia; Baltimore, Maryland; Belleville, Illinois; Cleveland, Ohio; Fort Worth, Texas, Natick, Massachusetts; and Tacoma, Washington. Carling recently signed an option to purchase land in the San Francisco Bay Area for an additional production facility.


Carling during the last ten years has built four of the most modern breweries in the world and purchased three others and has invested more than 80 million dollars in these plants and in plant expansion and modernization.



Safety Slogan


"BE CAREFUL TODAY; BE SAFE TOMORROW"

Steve's Ingenious


