Medicare Information Ready

By now, all elderly social security or railroad retirement beneficiaries in the Saginaw Valley should have received their medical information kits and the enclosed application for the supplementary medical insurance part of medicare, according to Stefan Gasparovic, Social Security District Manager.

The Social Security Headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland, working round the clock, has completed the mailing of medicare information kits to all of the 15.5 million persons 65 and over on the social security and railroad retirement benefit

rolls. Approximately 10,000 residents of the Saginaw Valley received these kits, Mr Gasparovic stated.

About 150 other older persons, those not on the social security or railroad retirement benefit rolls, have already been touch with the Social Security District Office in Saginaw, he reported. But many others still need to take action to protect their medicare rights.

Eight out of ten aged persons will be reached through the mass mailing, he noted. About one-third of those who will not be reached this way are receiving old-age assistance payments and will hear directly from their local welfare agencies.

Another third are still working full time and will need to file social security applications. Approximately 7,000 persons over 65 in the Saginaw Valley will also have to get in touch with their local Social Security District Office.

New Equipment In Service



FOR BETTER GRAIN HANDLING HERE - New equipment shown here permits more efficient handling of grain in our brewing process. Kernels remain intact instead of the cracking and chafing which occurred with the old system. The Fruehauf tank trailer shown here has five steel hoppers. It has a capacity of 1,350 cubic feet or about 3,300 bushels of grain, which is drawn directly from the hopper to rail car into this tank trailer. This unit facilitates conveyance of grain at a rate of 50,000 pounds an hour. Grain is unloaded at our plant into a receiver-filter on the Brewhouse roof.
