Saginaw County United Fund Campaign Sets Goal of \$712,500 For 1958 Needs

With but a nominal increase of \$3,050 in the total Saginaw County goal, the 1959 United Fund drive will get underway on Monday, October 13th with every expectation that the drive again will be a success.

Last year, Carling Frankenmuth personnel cooperated wonderfully in the county campaign, contributing more than \$3,150 to the United Fund.

This year's United Fund goal of \$712,500 will make necessary the continued cooperation of Saginaw County citizens if vital welfare activities are to be carried on next year.

Last year, for the first time, Carling personnel joined in a payroll deduction plan for contributing to the United Fund, with approximately 85 per cent of all personnel signing up for payroll deductions.

Vice President Les Freidinger, who again this year is serving as chairman of the Out Saginaw County Division, will direct all United Fund activities in the entire county, outside of the City of Saginaw. That area embraces 23 townships and six villages.

Serves Budget Committee

Wallace Riethmeier also will serve the United Fund as a member of the Budget Committee, and as a director of the Frankenmuth campaign.

Directing solicitations in the plant will be Herbert Naegele, personnel and safety director, and George Schmunk, president of Local 212.

In addition, many of our people and their families will give of their time -- as well as of their money -- by serving as solicitors in the door-to-door campaign that will be conducted.

Atlanta Plant Is Growing Threat To Our 'Safest Carling Plant' Record

Achievement of a third consecutive year without a lost-time accident -- a milestone passed on September 8th -- brought nation-*ride recognition to our plant and personnel.

Widespread newspaper publicity told of the record, and the United States Brewers Foundation in its Newsletter pointed out that the record is "rarely achieved and much-coveted." Thus, the entire brewing industry joined in saluting Carling Frankenmuth personnel for their outstanding record.


On the heels of this announcement, however, came a report from our Atlanta plant to the effect that we're going to have stiff competition in matters of safety from our new southern associates.

So far, the Atlanta plant personnel also have maintained a record free of lost-time accidents, and apparently they're determined to maintain that record, too.


Hence, in our intra-company competition for top safety honors and the Carling President's Cup, we have a new threat to our position at the top of the Carling group.













The team's score - 3006 pins - is the highest bowled in Saginaw County so far this season, but what disturbs members of the team is that they might have done so much better if fate had been kinder.

Ray Weiss, for example, bowled a 275 total in the last game, and that's an unusually fine score, of course. But Ray bowled nine consecutive strikes in that game, then, in the last frame got a spare.

Three more strikes would have given Ray a perfect 300 game!

Then too, Norman "Red" Zeilinger, owner of Zeilinger Beverage Company and sponsor of the team, was away that evening on business. Hence, the team was obliged to bowl without him and substitute his below-average handicap figure.

Had "Red" been there and bowled his average, the final count would have been substantially higher.

Team members racked up the impressive total of 67 strikes in downing the UE team 3006 pins to 2739 pins.

Here's how the scoring was done: Lloyd Keinath had 195-221-216 for a 632 total. Charles Zeilinger had 216-182-190 for a 588 total. Herb Naegele had 203-216-195 for a 614 total. And Ray Weiss had 189-210-275 for a 674 total.

While they have several regrets, the Black Label team members are nevertheless mighty proud of this score, and it gives them -- and all other teams in the league -- something to shoot at as the season progresses!
