



### **Veterans Honored**



# Carling Buys 9th Plant Site

Carling Brewing Company has signed an agreement for the purchase of thirtyfive acres of land in the San Francisco Bay area as a site for its ninth plant, H. E. Russell, president, has announced.

The site is in the new Crocker-Frement industrial park in Fremont, California, owned by the Bay Area Land Company. The purchase price was not disclosed.

Mr. Russell said that a definite construction schedule has not been established, "but our planning must be flexible at the moment." A specific timetable will be determined by the marketing and production requirements of our business with construction beginning probably late in 1964.

"Building a California plant has figured in our planning for several years," Mr. Russell continued. "The state's aggressive programs of in elligent business expansion has produced dynamic growth in which we are anxious to participate."

Carling is a remarkable success story in the brewing industry. Our company has registered an annual average sales growth of 23 per cent during the past twelve years and in 1962 had sales of 5,358,608 barrels.

Company officials credit the Carling plan of decentralized management for much of its success. Each major marketing area is managed by its own executive group operating as a team with responsibility for all management and marketing decisions.


The Bay area plant will be Carling's ninth. Our company is now building a plant in Fort Worth, Texas



"WHAT HAS NOT HAPPENDED IN 8 YEARS CAN HAPPEN IN 8 SECONDS!"


That is our highly appropriate September safety slogan, as we work toward our ninth year of operation without a disabling injury accident.

# July Sales Top Carling Record

Carling Brewing Company had the greatest sales month in its history during July, according to Henry E. Russell, president announced today. He said sales were up 12 per cent over the previous all-time high reached in June, 1962.

Mr. Russell said our company sold 634,447 barrels of beer and ale, equivalent to 8,565,035 cases of twenty-four 12 oz. bettles, nearly a million more cases than June, 1962 when it sold 7,647,548.

He pointed out that in July Carling sold more beer and ale than it did in the entire year of 1950 when the company sold 501,552 barrels and had but one plant in Cleveland, Ohio.

Since that time it has added six other plants, is now building a new facility in Forth Worth, Texas and has distirbution across the country. He attributed the rise to more favorable weather conditions and good efforts by Carling's marketing organization and its 700 independent wholesalers.

### Carling Float Wins

Our plant's parade float, one of the features of this year's Frankenmuth Bavarian Festival, won a trophy at the Reese Homecoming celebration over the Labor Day weekend. It was judged the best out-of-town entry. Our float was entered by Walter Schrader, night bottling superintendent.
